This summer included a few weddings, conferences and music fund raisers. We are looking forward to a very busy summer in 2021.




Annual General Meeting Postponed



International Day of Persons with Disabilities

Thursday, December 3rd

Almost one in three Nova Scotians aged 15 and older have a disability, which is the largest percentage of any province.

All Nova Scotians should be able to participate fully and effectively in society, without being limited by barriers. The Accessibility Act recognizes that accessibility is a human right, and has a goal of an accessible Nova Scotia by the year 2030.

Not all disabilities are obvious or can be easily seen by other people. Similarly, not all obstacles are recognized by everyone. Some problems are simple to solve, like changing the font of printed materials to make documents easier to read. Others involve a great deal of planning and expensive changes to infrastructure.

The Village of Pugwash is participating in joint Municipal committee meetings and learning workshops to work out how to make all parts of the Village accessible for everyone.

These sports are a great addition to our existing facilities that include horse racing, baseball, softball, disc golf and walking trails" says

We believe this project is timely and in the spring of 2021, we will be reaching out to the local schools and people of all ages with our focus on growing these sports through youth and adult programs that include coaching, training, clinics,

Tennis and Pickleball, similarly to golf and curling, promote bringing people together, provide opportunities for social networking, help to prevent cardiovascular diseases and diabetes, and reduce obesity. Moreover, they are sports mostly played outside that can be readily accommodated to physical distancing requirement in this time of COViD. As racquet sports that do not involve expensive

equipment, both are also readily accessible across income groups when public courts are available.

NTPA has done its homework. Competitive estimates obtained by NTPA indicate a new facility including washrooms and outdoor lighting for night-time play will cost \$200,000. We will be applying for grants from the Village of Pugwash; Municipality of Cumberland; the Province of Nova Scotia and the Federal Government for roughly 60% of the costs, with the balance to be raised by our association through fund-raising initiatives and community outreach. NTPA hopes to begin construction in June 2022 for a grand opening on July 15, 2022.
