Dave Gunning to Play Gathering of the Clans

Dave Gunning was born in Pictou County. Over the span of his career, Gunning has released thirteen albums, received a Juno Award nomination and has been awarded two Canadian Folk Music Awards and recognized with eight East Coast Music Awards.

He is known for the incorporation of story telling into his live show. In particular, Gunning relates anecdotes of notable characters from Pictou County and performs impressions of musicians that he has worked with over the years.

His songwriting skill has also been internationally recognized, with tunes scoring vic-



tories and high placings in major international songwriting competitions. As a fervent hockey fan, Dave was also thrilled to win the CBC's hotly-contested Hockey Night In Canada Song Quest in 2014 with "A Game Goin' On", a co-write with David Francey. Gunning has also remained in demand as a producer working with many artists.

For now, though, his concentrated focus is on *Up Against The Sky*. The record, and all that's yet to come from this compelling artist, can be looked forward to with great anticipation.

The 2019 season at Thinkers Lodge and Lobster Factory was extremely busy, primarily with weddings and conferences. Tourists came from every province and territory in Canada and 33 of the American states. From outside North America, travelers arrived from nineteen countries, with those from Germany signing the guest book most often.

The economic spinoffs for the village of Pugwash and surrounding area are numerous. For example, Sunset Industries handles all our weekly laundry of huge bags of bedding, towels and kitchen linens. Guests often stop by at the Farmers Market on Saturdays and cottages, motels and bed & breakfast rentals are necessary to accommodate the overflow of guests. It would be impossible to serve the guests without the local Co-op, service stations, and caterers. A remarkable amount of ice is purchased for events through the summer, one of many items sourced locally. While touring

the facility, visitors are guided to local cafés, restaurants and places to shop locally.

Thinkers Lodge is grateful to our university students who give tours to these eager tourists. They are also responsible for overseeing maintenance issues including garbage and recycling, mowing lawns, running cafés and open mics, and preparing the lodge for all the weddings and conferences. Cameron, Harvey, Abby & Emma were our friendly, knowledgeable, students excellently represented Thinkers Lodge.



The Friends of the Pugwash Estuary have been enjoying one of the best winter hiking seasons in several years. Both trails are in very good condition and have been used by locals and visitors through the season.

NCC Looking to expand protection of Pugwash Estuary

seeking donations to help protect important habitat for wildlife in northern Nova Scotia, near Pugwash. The charitable land trust is working to conserve a 65-hectare (162 acre) parcel of forested land on the southeastern shore of the Pugwash Estuary. The coastal property would expand NCC's Pugwash Estuary Nature Reserve to 644 hectares (1,591 acres) and create a continuous corridor of protected land along the Pugwash River.



The Pugwash Estuary is a critical stopover site for more than two dozen species of migratory shorebirds, such as greater yellowleg, spotted sandpiper and willet. The estuary's extensive salt marshes, beaches, eel grass beds and mudflats provide habitat for American black duck, green-winged teal, common goldeneye and great blue heron. Eastern

The Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC) is wood-pewee, a species listed as special concern under Canada's Species at Risk Act, is also found in the area, along with rusty blackbird, a species listed as provincially endangered. By conserving the forest around the estuary, NCC is helping protect the overall health of the habitat.

> The Pugwash Estuary Nature Reserve is a popular destination for birders and nature lovers and is one of NCC's Nature Destinations. The Nature Destinations program invites the public to explore some of the greatest examples of Canada's natural areas, from BC's interior to the prairie grasslands, to the coastal estuaries in Atlantic Canada. NCC maintains a trail at its Pugwash Estuary Nature Reserve in cooperation with Friends of the Pugwash Estuary. Visit http:// naturedestinations.ca/destinations/pugwashestuary.

> NCC is a charitable land trust and a conservation leader in Canada. It has been conserving land in the Pugwash area for 30 years. For this conservation project, NCC must raise \$70,000 from community donors in order to secure matching funds from the Government of Canada, through the Canada Nature Fund.

Built Heritage Project Update

I am truly amazed by the amount of material to go through to learn about the buildings in our area. Business directories, notes from talking to people, Facebook groups, genealogy databases, maps, land deeds, newspapers, and realty listings to name a few and then there is the complexity of the properties themselves. Our current house numbers civic addresses - were introduced in Nova Scotia during the 1980s and 90s but not enforced until the 2000s. Roads, like Brighton Avenue and Almond Street, have disappeared or changed over time. Buildings have been moved, torn down, or burned. Between 1877 and 1929 alone, there were 7 (!) major fires that hit Pugwash. It can be a daunting task but is well worth every hour.

We have started files on over 700 properties in 46 communities and will be continuing to collect information this year and beyond. We are very happy to welcome Elaine Graham Cook to this project! She has been out talking to people in the community and collecting histories and photos. You can also send us information using our online form at neumbhistorical.wixsite.com. Pugwash Point Lighthouse

In 1871, John B. Reed was granted a contract of \$1,195 to construct a lighthouse on Fishing Point – now known as Pugwash Point. It was built following a 'schoolhouse' design that also provided living space for the lighthouse keeper and his family. According to the Belcher's Almanac of 1888, the building stood at a height of 48 feet.

It became a notable local landmark that graced the front of postcards, was drawn by local artists, and photographed by Clara Dennis and W. R. MacAskill. A stone seawall was added to the land around the point in 1878 to help protect it from flooding and erosion. In 1880, the galley deck of the tower was rebuilt to allow for a more powerful light.

The lighthouse was replaced in 1960 by a new tower with skeletal lower sections. This is the lighthouse that continues to stand at Pugwash Point today. The original building was sold and moved to the nearby farm owned by the Mundles. It was severely damaged in 2017 by the elements and in poor condition by 2018 when it served its last function by providing hands-on



training for the local fire department in fire control practice.

Joint Project Goal is **High Speed Internet** Within Four Years

The Municipalities of Cumberland and Colchester are teaming up with Xplornet Communications and Develop Nova Scotia on a high-speed internet project that will see \$60 million invested in the region.

Xplornet will deploy nearly 700 kilometres of optic fibre to offer up to 100 Mbps fibre-to-home and fixed wireless services on their network, which will reach more than 21,700 currently underserved households and businesses. A further 2,300 addresses will have access to improved satellite service that will reach up to 50 Mbps by the completion of the full network. The three-year project is aiming for 100%





high-speed availability in Cumberland and Colchester.

Cumberland and Colchester will invest a combined \$6 million dollars over the next four years in exchange for twenty -vears of dedicated fibre ('dark fibre') which will be used for innovative community services and economic development. The Municipalities will not have an ownership stake in the new network or be responsible for its operation or upkeep.

The Nova Scotia Internet Funding Trust has approved an investment of \$19.9 million based on eligible project costs that total \$48.5 million. As part

of their Internet to Nova Scotia Initiative. Develop Nova Scotia will monitor construction and system performance for compliance with service levels promised by Xplornet.

Xplornet's \$34.3 million expenditure in Cumberland-Colchester is their latest in a series of fibre network investments across rural Canada that will reach \$500 million. The Municipalities selected Xplornet in a competitive procurement process.


