One Awesome Night Runs for a Second Year

One Awesome Night offers a re-enactment of the *Nativity Story* in the Town of Bethlehem. The Pugwash Farmers Market doubles as the ancient town, complete with live animals, market vendors, Roman soldiers, numerous citizens and, of course, Mary, Joseph, and the baby Jesus, all in period costume.

Last year's event was indeed an awesome night and the area churches are planning even more for this year.

The evening presentation will open Friday, December 6th at 6:00 pm with a musical narration of the nativity story with about twenty members from Cumberland Performing Arts.

Bethlehem comes to life for two hours and visitors are urged to dress in costume to become part of the living recreation.

While the tax collector makes his dramatic presence and the vendors hock their treats and drinks, no money actually changes hands. The event is entirely free, a Christmas gift from seven area churches.

Sunset Community to Open New Thrift Shop in Pugwash

In 2018, The Sunset Community opened a Thrift Shop and laundry in Oxford. Having achieved their operational goals with that program, the management team, led by Executive Director Julie Hoeg, have decided to establish a similar retail outlet at Sunset Industries on Crowley Road, Pugwash. Like Oxford, items for sale to the public will be a combination of used, sorted, clean donated clothing, furniture and household items and new, liquidated or returned product bought by the pallet load from Amazon and other retailers. Sunset's

program in Oxford has included a very popular on-line auction. This feature will be replicated and offered out of the remodeled operation in Pugwash.

The Sunset Community has remodeled its workshop program at Sunset Industries. The reorganization of vocational programs has included the combining of two woodshop programs and the elimination of pallet production, creating space for the new Thrift Store.

Renovations are expected to wrap up the first phase in December with an

open-to-the-public date expected in January 2020. Updates and other information is available on their Facebook group: "Sunset Industries" and at www.thesunsetcommunity.ca

Sunset has provided a sheltered workshop for residents of its own programs as well as for members of the community who need a day program/vocational program for many years. 24 adults, supported by 4 to 5 staff, work at the Sunset Industries every day.

NORTH CUMBERLAND MEMORIAL HOSPITAL AUXILIARY

A request from Site Manager, Barbie Cook to purchase a Total Body Stepper with wheelchair accessibility for the Physio Department of the North Cumberland Memorial Hospital was approved at our September meeting.

Three members attended the Nova Scotia Association of Health Auxiliaries (NSAHA) Convention in Truro on September 20th. The presentations by guest speakers Raj Makkar, speaking on physician recruitment; Gillian Power, speaking on the roles of primary care and specialty care Nurse Practitioners; and Carlis Coulter, speaking on the different levels of Paramedics and their changing responsibilities, were very informative. The NSAHA statistics for 2018 show that Health Auxiliaries across Nova Scotia provided \$628,848.81 for medical equipment; \$176,390.93 for non-medical items; \$83,461.22 to community projects; and \$65,100.00 in bursaries.

A farewell luncheon to thank Helen Cameron for the many years she has volunteered as our Thrift Shop Convenor was held recently at Inn the Elms. Not Too Late to Plant Spring Bulbs

Next spring and even in late winter, look out for some of the 270 spring bulbs the Village of Pugwash planted this fall. The flower garden in front of the old train station has been refurbished and is the home to many of the spring bulbs. They will then give over to mass plantings of perennials such as hosta and astilbe which will bloom through the summer.

Late winter we will first see white snowdrops and blue scilla poke their heads up through the snow. As spring progresses we will see a variety of crocus, then daffodils and various tulips.

Villagers are encouraged to join in and get some bulbs in the ground before freeze up so we can all enjoy the colours through the spring. Plant them pointy end UP, no deeper than three times their height, in well drained soil and in groups. Many bulbs will keep coming up each year, some dividing and making additional blooms as the years pass.

Lets make Pugwash BLOOM in the springtime too!

The Village Commission will support a committee that will look at the particular local needs and resources available and how to respond and recover when an emergency occurs.


This could be an emergency due to extreme weather, mass power outages or any of a wide number of possible scenarios that would make travel, communications or shelter difficult.

The Pugwash Fire Department's 50/50 Toonie Draw continues to grow in the community and surrounding areas. We have 11 drop boxes situated at Sunrise Country Market Port Howe, Wilson's Gas Bar, Pugwash Home Hardware, Scotia Bank, O'Brien's Pharmacy, Pugwash Kwik Way, F&D Esso, Monty's, Sheryl's Bakery & Café, The Lantern Restaurant and the

Sunset Community (for employees only).

We encourage our registered players to pre-pay in advance by placing bills or cheques in the drop boxes. Remember to tell us your number by applying the provided yellow sticker. You can also pre-pay by using e-transfers. The draw takes place every Wednesday evening between 6-7pm. The weekly drawn number is published on our Facebook page at Pugwash Fire Department Toonie Draw and on our website. Members of the public are welcome to come along to the Fire Station to witness the draw.

Please check out our site at pugwashfire.tooniedraw.ca to check the status of your number(s) and when they are about to run out. The website also shows our weekly winners and an up to date list of rules.

The home page on the web site shows when it was last updated, which is normally done after the Wednesday night draw. If you have paid during the week, it won't show up until after the draw.


