North Cumberland Health Care Centre Opens Monday June 10th

The new North Cumberland Health Care Centre is set to open its doors to the community on Monday, June 10, 2024!

We are excited to share information about the new equipment and upgrades and hear the enthusiasm from our staff and physicians. Below are some highlights about temporary changes to services as we coordinate moving and additional information about upgrades and improvements.

Collaborative Emergency Centre

The Collaborative Emergency Centre at North Cumberland Memorial Hospital will be closed from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. on June 9, reopening at 8 a.m. on June 10 at the new North Cumberland Health Care Centre.

Visiting Hours

On move day, general visiting will be restricted until 1 p.m. to minimize traffic and allow patients to settle into their rooms.

Limited Parking

Parking is located near the front entrance and will be temporarily limited until the demolition of North Cumberland Memorial Hospital is complete.

Safety

Barriers and signage will direct patients and visitors. Please use caution, respect the barriers, allow extra time for parking, and be mindful of construction crews and signage.

Upgrades and Improvements

Upgrades include medical gas systems piped in the walls, accessible washrooms, and track ceiling lifts—all designed to support staff well-being and enhance the care experience for our patients. Simple yet impactful improvements like separate triage and waiting rooms will improve privacy, while overhead equipment booms will allow teams to move easily around patients.

TEDxPugwash - A Sold-Out Event

Tickets for the first-ever TEDx event, to be held on Sunday, June 9 at The Peace Hall in Pugwash, sold out within hours of going on sale at the Pugwash Farmers' Market on Saturday, May 18. This enthusiastic response affirmed the event's Organising Committee's belief that there would be keen interest in our local community for a TEDx in Pugwash.

Grounded in the TED organization's new mantra that "ideas change everything", and honouring Pugwash's reputation as a hub for original thought as well as global peace initiatives, TEDxPugwash 2024 uses the Earth Charter's definition of peace to guide the talks to be presented on June 9: "The wholeness created by right relationships with oneself, other persons, other cultures, other life, Earth, and the larger whole of which all are a part."

TEDxPugwash's impressive lineup of nine speakers played no small part in sparking the community's response. Ranging from Guy Godfree, a graduate of Pugwash District High School (PDHS) and now an internationally acclaimed cinematographer, to Dr. James Raffan, noted explorer, author and long-time Gulf Shore resident, to PDHS students, Georgia Price and Emma Wilson, who have consistently impressed the Organising Committee, the inaugural event promises to be a day of thoughtful, entertaining and often deeply moving talks.

No Wake Zone

Boaters: please observe the no wake zone in Pugwash Harbour. The outdoor theatre in Eaton Park is a good visual cue of the location of where speeds should be dropped. This is to avoid creating a wake that is damaging to the environment, docks and is potentially hazardous to other boats, divers and swimmers.

FOPE has applied for a county grant to replace the steps and deck to the front door of Estuary House. We have moved ahead with architectural plans of what our interpretive center will look like. The next step will be to develop a building plan and time line and to establish funding. Very easy to say; no small task. FOPE will be looking for help from the community.

The composting toilet has finally been completed.

We have welcomed two student researchers from St. Franis Xavier University under the direction of Dr. David Garbary to spend the summer at Estuary House researching ribbed mussels on our salt marshes.

In addition, the Community Eelgrass Restoration Initiative (CERI) under the direction of Dr. Kristina Broerder from Dalhousie University. is planning to include the Pugwash Basin as a site for the CERI program to restore our dwindling population of eelgrass. Keep posted for the date and location of a "Planting Party" to be held in August.



Wildfire Risk Season

15th March to 15th October

No domestic brush burning or campfires are allowed between **8am and 2pm.** The entire online burn restrictions map will be in red during this time.

When burning is permitted from 7pm to 8am in certain counties, those counties will appear on the online map in yellow.

When burning is permitted from 2pm to 8am in certain counties, they will appear on the online map in green.

Burn restrictions are updated daily at 2pm.

You also need to follow municipality of Cumberland County Open Air Burning bylaw (21-06).

As of May 2024, fines are increased to \$25,000 which includes HST and a victim surcharge, bringing the total to \$28,872.50.

Conservation officers, police and other law enforcement officers can issue the fine on the spot in the form of a summary offence ticket.

Daily burn restrictions also now apply to provincial, municipal and private campgrounds (National parks are under the jurisdiction of Parks Canada).

A friendly reminder that we are in wildfire risk season until October 15th. No burning is permitted between 8am-2pm without an industrial permit. Industrial permits are required for any pile over 2m by 3m in size or if burning more than four piles at one time. Permits can be purchased by contacting your local DNRR. Burn restrictions are determined daily and posted on the Burn Safe NS webpage or available by calling 855-564-2876.

What is a Commissioner of Oaths?

A Commissioner of Oaths is a person appointed by the Minister of Justice, under the Notaries and Commissioners Act, to administer oaths and take and receive affidavits, statutory declarations and affirmations with the Province of Nova Scotia for use in the Supreme Court or any other court in Nova Scotia.

A Commissioner of Oaths cannot notarize documents to certify or verify that a document is a true copy of the original document - this requires a person to be a notary public. Only lawyers and MLAs may become notary publics in Nova Scotia.
