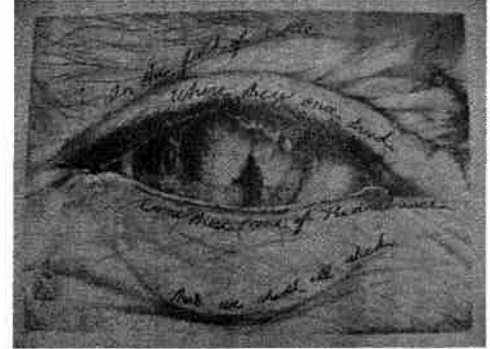


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Tim MacDonald wins national competition

Tim and a family member will be flown to the 2011 Remembrance Day celebrations held in Ottawa on Parliament Hill in November and his black and white poster will hang in the War Museum of our nation's capital.

The salmon represents gift of knowledge in the Gaelic storytelling traditions of Nova Scotia, Scotland and Ireland and the Isle of Man. The 'G' represents the Gaelic language and the ripples are the manifestations of the language through its attendant culture: song, story, music, dance and custom and belief system.

Lee Trenholm Remembered

Sunday, June 5th

About 130 family, relatives and friends of Lee Trenholm met at Eaton Park, Pugwash to remember Lee who had been the maintenance worker and grounds keeper for the Village of Pugwash for many years. Lee tragically died in a house fire in March.

Joe Webb conducted the proceedings with stories and remembrances of Lee from family and friends. Two of Lee's uncles, Peter and Charles (Digger) Trenholm sang moving songs. Lee was remembered as a quiet, patient person who cared for injured animals and would tolerate just about anything but injustice towards people or animals.

A granite bench was unveiled in memory of Lee. The bench is engraved with a saying he used frequently while taking a break in the park when friends old or new passed by: "come sit a while".

Gathering of the Clans—Established 1951

*** Diamond Jubilee ***

60th Anniversary of the Gathering of the Clans



The original function of the Gathering of the Clans was to raise funds for the Red Cross Hospital (opened November 1947) in west Pugwash. The present North Cumberland Memorial Hospital was opened in August 1966 and East Cumberland Lodge opened in 1975. Now in 2011 we are looking again at the possibility of a new medical facility. Projects such as this require 25% of costs to be raised by the community and again the importance of the Gathering of the Clans is clear – we need to raise funds to help build our new facility!

There have been some changes that have come and gone in the sixty years since the first *Gathering of the Clans and Fishermen's Regatta* was held in 1951. In the early years, the Gathering comprised mostly of Highland dancing, bagpipe competitions and fishing boat races. The first street parade was in 1960. Over the years there have been ox pulls, clan tents, bed races, queen's competitions, "theatre under the stars" and magic shows. The fishing boat races were held until 1968 and through the 1970s and 80s there were sailing regattas. Music entertainment in Eaton Park has included famous singers and bands such as Rawlins Cross, John Allan Cameron, Matt Minglewood and last year Sons of Maxwell played until the fireworks were set off.

The Highland Dance competition is sanctioned by ScotDance and the Pugwash competition is an important part of a competing dancer's year. Their competition runs all morning on the stage in Eaton Park.

The Highland pipe and drum competitions for individuals and bands are sanctioned by the Atlantic Canada Pipe Band Association. These start right after the Parade and continue all afternoon on the grounds of Thinkers' Lodge, a national historic site. Competing bands also march in the Parade.

The heavyweight Highland exhibition games offer an opportunity to witness the extraordinary skills and strength of these athletes. National and international heavyweight champions are seen exhibiting their prowess in Pugwash through the afternoon of July 1st at the Cyrus Eaton Elementary School playgrounds.

These events are integral to the festival, but do not directly generate funds. Primarily these come from entrance gate fees, but also from sponsorship and vendor fees. There is no fee to enter the Parade, but the Parade attracts many hundreds of people who in turn support the Gathering of the Clans. Currently, funds go to the hospital auxiliary and a variety of other local non-profit groups such as the Pugwash Volunteer Fire Department and Pugwash Ground Search and Rescue.

### Tick Talk

What are Ticks and Where are they found?

Ticks feed on warm-blooded animals and thrive in areas near water. They like tall grass and shrubs, where they wait before attaching to a passing host. They attach to the host by inserting their mandibles and feeding tube into the skin.

A tick can remain on the host for up to 2 weeks before dropping off. The two most prevalent species of ticks found Canada are the American Dog Tick and Brown Dog Tick. They are found in Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia. The Black-Legged Tick or Deer Tick is also found in Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and Manitoba.

Ticks can carry and transmit bacteria and parasites which can lead to a multitude of serious symptoms and conditions such as Lyme disease.


How to Protect Your Pet

Inspect your pet on a regular basis, especially after visiting areas where ticks are more likely to be found.

Remove tick promptly if found, ask your veterinarian how to do this safely. Dispose of tick in a jar of rubbing alcohol – water does not kill them and they are very hard to crush.


Ask your veterinarian to recommend a safe and effective tick removal product.

### Application to the Nova Scotia Utilities and Review Board (UARB) to Dissolve the Village

Last March, the UARB made a decision in favour of the Village in an application to reduce the size of the Village.

Shortly after this, a new petition was circulated around the Village to make an application to the UARB to dissolve the Village of Pugwash entirely. If the Village is dissolved, the law does not allow for it to be reinstated. Ever.

The Village of Pugwash has filed an objection to this application, making a number of requests, one of which is for a plebiscite. Preliminary hearings have set the dates for the hearing as starting October 11th. This will be followed by a plebiscite. The Village has engaged legal counsel.

Anyone wishing to speak at the evening session on October 11th must notify the Board of their intention no later than September 9th. Written comments must be submitted by September 30th.
