

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Pugwash Multi-Purpose Centre Detailed design and business plan to go ahead

The next phase to construct a multi-purpose Centre in Pugwash is set to go ahead. Over several years the project has gone from initial meetings to a set of conceptual drawings to a series of public consultations, a more formal set of drawings to locating, purchase and preparation of the site and now to a detailed design and business plan.

A committee made up of members of the community as well as representatives from Communities in Bloom, the library, the YMCA, the historical society, has been working diligently with the Municipality of Cumberland County and the Village of Pugwash to help bring the

Pugwash Multipurpose Centre (MPC) to fruition. The purpose of the multipurpose centre is to provide a facility for community residents to use for classes, events, private functions, a walking circuit and a new home for the library.

The MPC is one of the components of the Pugwash Waterfront Development project. Parts of that project have already been completed, with the Farmers Market development in 2018 and the Harbourfront Centre in Eaton Park (2019).



The most recent development is funding from the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency and the Municipality of Cumberland to create a business plan for the facility and a detailed building design, which will bring it to "shovel ready" status.

Next steps will be fundraising – especially for furnishings and interior finishes.

Pugwash Harbourfront Centre

There are a few final touch-ups to completely finish up the Harbourfront Centre, but it is otherwise complete.

The official opening ceremony was July 1st as part of the opening ceremonies for Canada Day and Gathering of the Clans. It was a very wet day, so not a lot of people were present for that! It has since been used for HarbourFest, the Fire Department fishing tournament, Gospel in the Park and for a couple of small meetings. Just as the old stage was used, there has been a lot of informal use over the summer by children playing, dancing and singing and a ladies group from Halifax performed some songs in late June. An Open House was held on Sunday, August 25th followed by higher. The Village made a number of music from the stage.

We would love to hear from any groups that would like to book the building for shows, rehearsal space, exercise or dance classes, or whatever else one's imagination can take them. There has been some interest in starting up a performing arts group of some kind. Anyone interested in participating or has particular performing skills they would share in a class should contact the Village Clerk.



The original before tax budget for the building was \$450,000. The first call for tenders resulted in quotes substantially higher. The Village made a number of cut backs to the design which required changes to the detailed plans. The second set of tendered quotes resulted in a winning bid of \$438,624. As with any building project, there were a few unexpected cost over runs and some other areas where savings could be made. The overage came to \$33,626 (7.67%).

The cost of construction of the building is covered by funding from Village reserves and grants from the Municipality and the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency. Another part of the revenue to

cover costs is the rebate due from HST.

The Village would like to pay its invoices due as promptly as possible, particularly as this delay can be reflected in how quickly local subcontractors are paid by the main contractors. Due to the delay in receiving the last parts of project funding and tax rebate and in order to pay off all invoices due, the Village needs to temporarily borrow funds.

To borrow funds, the Municipal Government Act requires that the electorate of the Village must first agree by vote. A meeting has been called for October 7th (see notice below).

Municipal Water Update

To date, nearly one hundred customers have connected to the Municipal water supply. We are happy to be supplying clean, safe and reliable water to residents and businesses in the village. It is especially good to know that in the event of a power outage, such as was experienced recently with Hurricane Dorian, water will still be available to customers. The water treatment plant in Rockley is fully serviced with a back-up generator and the chlorine booster station, near the Pugwash River Road, can be serviced with a portable generator should the need arise.

Residents are reminded that the Municipality is continuing to flush water through the system at several points to maintain water quality on dead end lines. These locations are Gulf Shore Road, Pugwash Point Road, Gulf Lane, Water Street, Howe Street, Willow Lane, Irishtown Road, Sunset Home and Highway 6 near the Firehall. As more customers connect to the system, these flushing points will be reviewed.

North Cumberland Community Health Foundation (NCCHF) held its Annual General Meeting in the Village Hall boardroom in June. The highlight of the meeting were guest speakers Jason Capson and Angele Arseneault Directors of the "Sculpt" Health and Wellness Program They provided those present with an informative overview of their corporate program which was provided to interested staff at North Cumberland Memorial Hospital this past spring, cost shared 50/50 by our NCCH Foundation.

NCCHF Chair Brian Gordon reported that the foundation has purchased a number of pieces of equipment to support the hospital and Primary Health Care services including: a mobile language interpreter (see photo) for nurses, doctors and/or EHS staff to more effectively communicate with patients for whom English is not their first

language, a medical dictation software device for more timely transfer of patient visit information into the electronic health record and a new vital signs monitor. The Foundation made a yearly contribution of \$3,000 to the Cumberland Careers Bursary program.

The 15th annual Northumberland Links Golf Scramble (our major yearly fundraiser) was held at Northumberland Links. The Links provides us with free use of their wonderful facilities for this event every year. Things we have learned from Post-tropical Cyclone Dorian, and other emergencies

Even though we knew there was a large storm coming, Dorian took a lot of us by surprise in the degree of damage it did to power lines, roads and bridges. Usually we get some warning of a storm and we have time to prepare, but there are other kinds of emergencies that can be much less predictable. We just pulled though a doozy of a practise run - now is the time to get ready for the next one.

Through social media, we asked the public for their hints and tips as to what to do to get ready for an event, There were some great ides which are Check out the pages listed below. listed below. We suggest keeping this list as a reminder to GET READY, Stay Safe and what to after the storm (real or metaphoric) has passed.

There is a lot of literature available online. The Village is looking at getting hard copies available, but for

those who can get online, do it now. before the emergency, and prepare.

Prepare and GET READY

- Assume that you will be at your home (or business) for at least 72 hours.
- Generators. Get a generator that will suit your needs. Some people will need a big machine, but that can be difficult to get moved to where you want it. Smaller ones are easier to carry, but won't supply as much power. Do some research now while you have time to make a decision.
- · Get an electrician to install the correct panel. Get the right cords and know where to find them when you want them.
- Learn how to use it properly. How does the breaker work? How many things can get plugged into it at a time? Find that out now.
- Put a plug end on your water pump power line. Now it is ready to plug into a regular receptacle or an extension cord connected to the generator.
- Induction hot plates only require 110v and are fast, safe and efficient.
- If you only have overhead lights, get a table lamp to plug into the generator.
- Run it for 5-10 minutes every month or so and keep ahead with a supply of fresh gasoline.
- Share. If you can't afford a generator, maybe make an arrangement with your neighbour and at least power or recharge the essentials (pumps, fridge and lights). Share water, internet or cell signal, propane or heat with your neighbour.
- Gas up the vehicle.
- Fill up your thermos with hot water.
- Charge up your phone, laptops, back up battery packs etc.

- Financials. Have some cash set aside for when the ATM doesn't work or runs out of cash. Preauthorized payments will likely continue as arranged. Do you have enough funds in the right account to cover those payments?
- Radio. When the power and internet are out, a battery/solar or crank operated radio will keep you informed as conditions change. Make a list of all the local radio station frequencies. Some may also lose power (and signal).
- Get ahead of chores that need power.
- Have at least 72 hours worth of medications, food and water. Don't forget your pets or livestock need food, water and medications too.
- A kiddie pool with some dirt or litter in it will serve as an emergency litter trav for dogs too scared to go outside.
- A full freezer stays cold longer than an empty one. Start making ice to fill up the freezer. Excess ice in a bowl helps keep the main part of the fridge cool.
- Plan how to make and keep contact with family and friends.
- Keep warm. Do you have a back up heating system and enough fuel? Quilts and blankets can keep you warm and can keep your fridge/freezer cold. Wrap up!
- Water is heavy. Four 4 litre jugs are much easier to carry than one 16 litre jug. The smaller jugs are easier to stash away for a stormy day too.
- Stock up on treats, storm chips and card games.
- Find out where the comfort station for your area is. The stations for Pugwash are currently the Fire Station and the Legion.

During and after a storm or other Emergency

- ♦ Generators. Use outside only and keep far enough away from the building so that fumes cannot get drawn inside. Only connect to a correctly installed panel. Use grounded extension cords that are heavy enough to carry the power load.
- ♦ If your battery radio isn't working and it is safe to go outside, use the car radio. The antenna on it picks up a signal way better than most inside radios.
- Outages can be patchy. Just because your power is restored, that doesn't mean everyone is. Check on your neighbours to be sure they are OK too.
- ♦ Make notes for next time and use them to prepare for the next storm. Regularly check and revise your notes.
- ♦ Take the burner element out of your electric stove top and use a tealight for heating up water or frying pan.
- ♦ Bring your solar garden lights inside at night to use as safe nightlights.
- ♦ If on a well, turn off the water supply to the toilet. No need to waste good well water on filling the toilet tank. It is easy to forget and flush that last bit of water.
- ♦ Listen to the radio and monitor the situation. Is it getting better or worse? Judge when it is safer to stay in place or seek shelter somewhere else.
- ♦ Assume any kind of downed wire is live.
- ♦ High winds can carry objects far, wide and fast. Keep safely out of the wind if at all possible.
- ♦ Cleaning up fallen trees and limbs use a sharp saw and wear the appropriate protective gear.

Eaton Park damage during Post Tropical Cyclone Dorian

There were very few properties in and around Pugwash that did not sustain some damage during the storm that blew through the region during the first weekend of September.

The brand new Harbourfront Centre came through without any problems at all but two elderly trees in the park were damaged. One has already been removed and the other will be taken down when weather conditions cooperate. They will be replaced in the Spring.

Waves crashing into the armour rock sea wall undermined large sections of the boardwalk. This is fenced off and barricaded. The public is asked to please keep away from the area, including the section adjoining the Lobster Factory, until re-



pairs can be made. We are waiting for insurance adjusters to inspect the area before arranging for repairs.

The Village Hall was able to provide water to those not yet on the municipal supply system or from outside of that catchment area. In cooperation and coordination with the Municipality of Cumberland County we hope to able to continue to be able to offer this service. See also page 9.


