Just three years after post tropical storm Dorian, the fury of Fiona far surpassed the ire of Dorian.

There was no known loss of life in the Village or area attributable to the storm, but there was damage to many homes, businesses and recreational facilities, including Eaton Park.

We ask that the public keep away from the boardwalk area until repairs and/or reconstruction are complete.

The loss of trees around the Village is probably in the hundreds. Some trees have been weakened and may yet fall down. Please keep aware of and avoid any damaged trees or structures. Do not approach downed wires and report them to Nova Scotia Power.

The power is gradually being restored in Pugwash. For those still not connected to power, water and internet can be had at the Village Hall and at the old train station/Farmers Market.

As we all start to clean up the mess or cover over damaged roofs or sheds, a common scene is to not just see neighbour helping neighbour, but stranger helping stranger. In times of need, Martimers know how to step up and lend a hand. Thank you to all those who help and thank you for your patience while waiting for that help.

North Cumberland Memorial Hospital Construction Update



Progress continued on the construction of the new North Cumberland Health Care Centre throughout the summer with the installation of the electrical and mechanical systems and the building's windows. Final connections have been completed to the geothermal piping on the inside of the building. Interior partitions to frame the rooms are now being built. Some masonry work is underway as well as construction of the retaining wall.

Construction should be finished in late winter/early spring of 2023. It is expected that staff and physicians will begin seeing patients and providing care in the new facility later in the spring. Disaster Financial Assistance for Hurricane Fiona Damage

Use the Disaster Assistance for Residential Property Application Form to apply for financial assistance for damage or loss to your residential property from Hurricane Fiona.

The Disaster Financial Assistance Program helps residential property owners and tenants with costs to repair or replace uninsurable, essential basic property loss (like appliances and furniture) due to Hurricane Fiona. The program is also available to small businesses and non-profits.

Repair and replacement costs for insured and insurable items (even if insurance wasn't purchased) are not eligible for assistance. Food lost due to Hurricane Fiona also isn't eligible for assistance.

Financial assistance provides up to \$200,000 for repair and replacement costs.

211 Nova Scotia can answer questions about the application process and help identify what information and supporting documents you need.

Eligibility

Residential property owners can apply for financial assistance if:

- the damage occurred during Hurricane Fiona on 23 to 24 September 2022
- you don't have insurance to cover your entire loss
- you own the property
- the property is your primary residence

Residential property tenants can apply for financial assistance if:

- the damage occurred during Hurricane Fiona on 23 to 24 September 2022
- you rent or lease the property
- you lost contents of your rental unit

- you don't have insurance to cover your entire loss
- the property is your primary residence

You need to apply by 31 January 2023.

How to apply

- Complete the Confirmation of Insurance Form and application form.
- Check the application for details on all required supporting documents.
- Send your completed application and supporting documents by mail.

It should take 6 to 8 weeks for the Emergency Management Office to review your application and let you know if you're receiving financial assistance. It can take longer if more information is needed or if your application hasn't been filled in correctly.

There is no cost to apply.

Before you start

Make sure you have:

- name of insurance company, policy number, and agent's name and phone number
- photos of the damage, as well as any "before" photos if you have any
- itemized description of damage or loss and replacement cost estimates
- copy of your rental agreement, if applicable
- authorized representative of your insurance company available to complete and sign the Confirmation of Insurance Form

Pugwash Communities in Bloom volunteers, new and old, met the challenges this summer. Their energy and dedication resulted in lush gardens, planters spilling over with petunias, lots of garden celebrations and artists descending on Eaton Park.

This July, Pugwash CIB was delighted to host National Communities in Bloom judges, Lorna McIlroy from Grande Prairie AB and Linda Tomlinson from Kelowna BC, During a two-day visit, judges were able to meet representatives from a number of local organizations and businesses, including Friends of the Pugwash Estuary, Cumberland Trails, Sunrise Greenhouses, KGB Recycling, HarbourFest, Open Hamper Food Bank, Pugwash Open Air Gallery, the Tennis/Pickleball Assoc., Sport Pugwash, Bill Mundle Marina, Thinkers Lodge, and many more. Representatives of all three levels of government outlined how our community is administered and funded for new projects including the hospital, Harbourfront Centre Stage, library and tennis/ pickleball facility. Pugwash will receive judges' recommendations in late October during the National CIB Symposium.

As our part in THE YEAR OF THE GARDEN 2022, a nation-wide program, we offered a number of informative and fun events in our community:

• CELEBRATION OF GARDENS 2022
Celebration of Gardens recognizes and celebrates gardens and the hard work of gardeners in our beautiful village and surrounding area. Container gardens, vegetable gardens and children's gardens...all being acknowledged. The public was invited to nominate gardens by submitting photos and brief descriptions, gardens were visited and featured on CIB's Facebook page in August.

• SCHOOL GARDENS
Cyrus Eaton Elementary students
planted seeds in their classroom,
tending to them and watching them
grow this past school year. In the
spring they were busy in the gar-

dens, weeding and getting the soil ready to plant their seeds and transplants. During the summer the produce from the various fruit trees and plants was available for the community to pick and enjoy. A group of enthusiastic children from the village, under the guidance a dedicated CIB volunteer, have been busy planting seeds and tending to the gardens during the summer months. They are hoping to have flowers to pick and share soon!

• 'TAKE ME' FLOWERS

This small but thoughtful, and much appreciated, effort saw a number of bouquets of flowers pop up in the village. Delighted 'finders' were encouraged to take these beautiful gifts home, compliments of CIB.

The public was encouraged to share photos of their favourite trees and tell us why on the CIB Facebook page. Our volunteers have been busy in the last few years identifying and planting trees in our village. Paying attention to and protecting the health our trees is a priority of Pugwash CIB.

• OPEN GARDENS
Garden lovers were invited to visit three outstanding gardens in our area one hot Saturday in July. Seventy-seven visitors toured gardens on the Gulf Shore (Liz Clarke), Pleasure Cove (Vandewiels) and Prince Albert St.(Valerie Brown) in Pugwash and get pointers and recommendations from experienced gardeners.

• ASK A GARDENER SERIES
July was also an opportunity to visit gardeners with expertise in growing perennials (Debbie Cameron), vegetables (Dot Pal at the Open Hamper Community Garden) and native plants (Gerald Gloade, Mi'kmawey Debert Cultural Centre) in coordination with the Pugwash Farmers' Market.

As part of our Pugwash Open Air Gallery initiative, CIB partnered with Pugwash HarbourFest to host 'ART IN THE PARK' on July 30 in Eaton Park. The focus was on the joy of creating art and featured local artists and artisans and their creations. Activities included:

Art Demo Tent - Six Artists demonstrated their creative process and shared information in a free, safe, collaborative environment under a tent in the middle of the community festival. All ages took


part in hands-on art-making; asked questions; learned techniques; tried new art mediums. Pottery, tapestry, hooking, painting, natural dying and photography was represented. In addition, one artist received the public at his home gallery.

• Tie a Knot for Peace - the public was invited to 'write a message for peace' on colourful ribbons and tie them to a new steel Peace Sculpture in Eaton Park. This reinforced Pugwash's history in the peace movement as well as enabled the public to participate in creating the art installation.

Guided Art Tour - visitors toured the art installations on a eight-passenger cart pulled by an antique tractor, with guided commentary, learning about the work of local artists included in the Pugwash Open Air Gallery. Visitors to the village could also take their own self-guided walking tour using POAG maps.

Artful Trees - seven organizations and businesses decorated trees, adding creative whimsy to Eaton Park.

FOPE was also very pleased to welcome the judges from the Communities in Bloom organization for a visit to Estuary House, to learn about FOPE and our mandate to be involved in the community and with CIB. In August we were also pleased to have a visit from Becky Parker, the Co-ordinator for Nature NS to discuss how Nature NS can assist us with our plans for the future.

Thanks to a very generous donation, FOPE was able to stabilize and restore our building beside Estuary House. Our plans for this building include developing it as an interpretive centre which would house themed displays about the Pugwash Estuary, it's natural and human history. This work will continue over the next several years and will require ongoing summer employment opportunities and fund-raising efforts. Our trails continue to be used on a daily basis and require ongoing maintenance and development, and our boat launch has been used more this summer. FOPE welcomes increased interactions with nature but we need to increase awareness as well of the need to protect and preserve or natural environment.

Pugwash's new library will soon be a reality

Work on \$2.198-million facility is continuing near the intersection of Highway 6 and Durham Street and should be completed by the end of October with the library opening in early 2023. The 3,700-square-foot library is being built by Iron Maple Constructors and will replace the library in that has called the village's former train station home since 1988.

Cumberland County Mayor Murray Scott said council made the decision to move forward with the project because it's something that's needed and will serve people along the North Shore. "I believe this is more than a library, it will be a gathering place for the community," the mayor said. "A great deal of credit has to be given to the fundraising committee and the community for the support offered to this great project already." The project is the culmination of a process that began eight years ago, in 2014, when the Pugwash Library Centre Feasibility Study and Concept Design was developed.

The need for a community library has been highlighted for several years: before the 2014 Pugwash Centre Feasibility Study and Concept Design was developed, it was established that building a new library was one of the key community priorities.

The current library is very small, at only 802 square feet, with limited storage and circulation

space around library stacks. It is not accessible for those using wheelchairs, strollers and walkers, and it lacks programming space, computers, staffing space, storage and sufficient washroom facilities.

In the Cumberland Public Libraries' facilities review, the Pugwash Library was the only one of seven libraries to be classified as being in "poor"

condition.

The Pugwash library, despite its current condition, is a remarkably well-used community asset. As of 2019, almost all Pugwash residents are members of the library, a measurable endorsement of the facility and value the community has for its public library. "There have been a couple of different versions of what this was going to be. This has come together quickly from completing and issuing the RFP in March, awarding the contract in April and design and detail

plans starting in May. It's a priority for the county and it's happening."

Cumberland County's chief librarian Denise Corey is thrilled with progress. "We're very excited and will be thrilled to move into the new library," Corey said. She said the new building, which is four times larger than the existing library, will provide so much more opportunity for the community. For example, she said, the new library will include program space – something the existing one doesn't have. "Right now, the book club can only meet when the library is closed because there just isn't the space," Corey said. "The opportunities are almost endless."

The Municipality of the County of Cumberland is providing \$1.5 million with the community expected to raise \$500,000. "The community has really supported the project and the fundraisers have almost raised the community's portion of the funding," Corey said. "That says a lot about the community and what a new library means to it."

The midway games and rides were unavailable. They were replaced by inflatable activity area which was very popular. Just as the Midway charged for entry to their rides and paid the GOC a percentage as a vendor fee, this year there were wristbands to be purchased for unlimited entry or one-ride-only tickets. The GOC broke even on costs. Now we have explored this area of entertainment we can prepare and plan on an expansion of the kinds of inflatables and activities, reaching a wider audience in a cost effective way.

With the addition of beach toys and bubbles, the volleyball court became a very popular sand pit, entertaining youngsters for free all day.

26 vendors registered for the day. Four didn't show. Most of the vendors were new to the festival, COVID having taken its toll on many others.

Many antique cars and tractors joined the parade and stayed to be admired while parked at Mundle's Funeral Home.

The Opening Ceremony was held on the Pugwash Harbourfront Centre (PHC) in English and French. Competition and parade winners were announced from the stage and those present were awarded their prizes. A delicious, giant birthday cake was donated by Donna Guthro. Dr Stephen Ellis, MP helped cut the cake and distribute to the appreciative crowd. The new interpretive Gaelic signs project



was unveiled (See page 4). Many people were pleased to see the old tam at the back of the stage for the day. The old cut

outs are very fragile. We are working on a solution to safely restore or reproduce them for more frequent display.

The entertainment at the PHC were Paul Randy Mingo, Alycia Putnam and family, Christina Martin and Dale Murray and finally Dave Gunning with his son. The fireworks, in colours representing the Double Jubilee theme of the day, were set off around 10pm.

The gates were run by volunteers from several local organizations. Advance sales and the six gates took in \$20,103, from the sale of 4,300 wristbands. This was about 85% of our usual numbers.

Thank you to the 120 or more volunteers that helped the day go smoothly and coped with a very different festival this year. All the various events, parade security, the gates and bankers are all run by volunteers and all deserve big thanks!

Paid help also helped make the day run smoothly and professionally: Hub City Sound (sound and lights), Scotty Brown (stage manager), the competition judges and HRM Inflatables staff.

Thanks also go to the many sponsors whose generosity help make this historic event a success. There were fewer Bronze sponsors this year but more Silver and Gold level sponsors. They make a tremendous difference in keeping this festival going.

A Ceilidh in the Park was planned for Saturday July 2nd but was cancelled due to rain and high winds.

Advance sales at the Visitor Information Centre improved again this year and we see that as a useful means of selling wristbands in the future.

Preparations and meetings for next year's event are already under way. Many hundreds of paid and volunteer time goes into a successful festival. Ideas and help are always welcome.
