

#### Windsor Salt **Basketball Tournament**

Pugwash, Division 4 Provincial champions, will co-host the inaugural Windsor Salt Basketball Tournament which promises to be the "biggest high school basketball tournament basketball ever seen in this province" says organizer, Vincent Pye.

14 teams from all over Nova Scotia will compete December 6th and 7th in high school gyms in Pugwash, Oxford and Tatamagouche. The two day event has 24 games with 4 winners of the round robin play. Semi-finals will be at 2pm Saturday in Pugwash and Oxford and the finals will be at 6pm in Pugwash. Canteen services will be available at all three gyms.

Teams will come from Cape Breton, Halifax, the Valley and Northern divisions.

#### PUGWASH AND AREA MASTER PLAN REPORTS

#### Pugwash Groundwater Exploration update

From the beginning of the Pugwash Groundwater exploration program our goal has been to locate a source of groundwater of sufficient quantity and quality to supply the needs of the Village of Pugwash while being located in an area that can be protected from future pollution.

Last winter we drilled 6-6" test wells in Pugwash River which concluded with a 72 hour pump test ending in early March. The results did not meet our objective so the exploration program continued to phase 2 in the Pugwash River area and the Irishtown Road area in July. We drilled 2 wells in Pugwash River (south west of the wells already drilled) where we found excellent quantity but the quality did not meet our expectations. We then drilled 2 more wells near the east end of the Irishtown Road expecting to find water in quantities and quality similar to the golf course wells. The results were very discouraging.

We attended a steering committee meeting in Pugwash on September 19<sup>th</sup> to provide a project update and liaise with the local members and decided to proceed with phase 3 of the exploration program on the old Murray road in Pugwash River. Two wells were drilled in October both of which indicate an excellent quantity of available groundwater. We are now preparing for a 72 hour pump test which will confirm not only the quantity available but also give us a strong indication of the quality of the water in that location. This work will be carried out once the access roads are frozen, hopefully by early December.

#### Multi Purpose Centre

WHW Architects has recently been engaged to take us to the next step of the Multi-purpose Centre process. They will research and prepare a feasibility study which will look at such issues as possible locations for the Centre, funding opportunities and a business plan while paying careful attention to comply with all standards as set out in the project terms of reference.

Various stakeholders at all levels will be contacted and the report should be ready early next year. This process may seem slow, but it is important that time is taken to do these studies correctly and accurately so stay tuned for more information.

#### **Tourism Action Team**

The Village of Pugwash, with help and input from the Tourism Action Team, has replaced and added signage in and around the village this year. Updated interpretive panels were installed in Eaton Park, replacing panels that were quickly disintegrating, and a large aerial picture of the Village core is mounted on the exterior of the train station as a way finding resource. The new panels and signs are made of materials that resist weather. The Village also replaced the "gateway" signs on the highways entering the Village.

The next project for this Action Team will be to assist with the new visitors information centre at the Village Hall (see page 3).

## Communication and Collaboration Action Team (CCAT)

CCAT has been working on a variety of projects. A database of the nearly 60 non-profit groups in the Pugwash area is being collated to be made available on the village website. The website will be improved and updated and eventually will be rebuilt entirely. The team would welcome assistance from any experienced web designers.

In collaboration with the Pugwash Village Commission and the Parks Commission, CCAT is working towards producing a multipurpose open space at the north end of Eaton Park. Part of this project is to make a larger, level area and another part of the project is to improve access to the boardwalk. The Village Commission has agreed to look at extending the sidewalk on Water Street to the end of the park, to then tie in with the boardwalk, and the Parks Commission has agreed to looking at improving their landscaping to allow for such an area.

#### Visitor Information Centre (VIC) at the Village Hall


Visitors to this area have not had a VIC to go to for some help finding attractions, events, food or accommodations in the area for a few years now. While posters and the internet are very useful, there is nothing quite like that personal touch when a local can welcome a visitor and help them out with their unique inquiries.

The Pugwash Village Commission will partner with the Pugwash C@P Site and local businesses and install a new VIC through the summer months at the Pugwash Village Hall. Space, resources and personnel will be shared with the Pugwash C@P Site. This is expected to be advantageous on all sides and get Pugwash back on the map in the listings for information centres for the province.

Signage with the familiar big question mark should be installed on the approaches to the village in the spring in time to invite visitors to stop, and maybe stay a while, in Pugwash.

#### LED Holiday Light Exchange

Bring two strands of traditional holiday lights to the Pugwash Village Hall on Friday December 6th from 3pm to 5pm, and we'll give you a free string of energy-saving LED lights. #### Friends of the Pugwash Estuary (FOPE)

The Friends of the Pugwash Estuary (FOPE) had a busy summer. Activities included the Harbour-Fest boat tours, information booths for Canada Day and Harbour-Fest, and the Annual Flotilla. The flotilla included over 30 kayaks and canoes. We continued with the Community Aquatic Monitoring Pro- The newly acquired property at gram (CAMP) and collaborating with Nature Conservancy Canada (NCC).

Four jobs were provided in the community, including a three person crew working on habitat restoration and a student working on other projects.

The three field workers worked on Canfield Creek, Patton Brook, Big Lake Brook and William's Lake. Obstructing debris was cleaned up, water deflectors in-

stalled, brush mats constructed to catch sediment, culverts cleaned out and a fish ladder on Williams Lake was repaired. A fence and some gravel were used to encourage cattle to use the crossing on Patton Brook.

2169 Crowley Road (Docherty Creek) has already seen some improvements and is on its way to becoming an interpretive/research centre, with meeting space, trails, an interpretive kiosk, and public river access. Some of the outside work is very evident: the FOPE sign, surrounded by a rock wall, has been erected, the ditches have been cleaned, brush has been completely cleared in some areas and there has been grid clearing in others to allow room for the trees to grow, and garbage sites have been

removed. Hopefully, the very old and shaky osprey pole will be replaced before winter.

The house has had an energy audit, a new heating system installed, and improved insulation. Work is underway to open up some inside walls to provide space for meetings and other gatherings. Many other improvements are planned as money becomes available.

The group has achieved charitable status and is now in a position to issue tax deductible receipts for donations.

Through the winter months, FOPE meetings are on the first Tuesday of each month at 7 pm at the Curling Club. Check us out on Facebook!

The 62nd anniversary Pugwash Gathering of the Clans went exceptionally well, despite the ominous weather forecast.

The Canada Day Parade was declared by many to be the best in many years and the fireworks were the best, some said, they had ever seen in Pugwash. The competitions carried on without a hitch and the entertainment in Eaton Park was enjoyed by a large crowd throughout the afternoon and evening.

A full slate of one hundred dancers competed on Eaton Stage in Highland Dance. The Bonnie Gael Huston Memorial award went to Amelia English of Pictou.

The theme for Canada Day was "The Year of the Korean War Veteran". Harold Patterson, a veteran of the Korean conflict, was Parade Marshall. There were some very imaginative entrants in the Canada Day Parade. Winners in the non commercial category was Pugwash District High School, 2nd: Ridgewood Farms, 3rd: Springhill Miners Museum. In the commercial class, first went to Canadian Salt Company Ltd, 2nd: Cunningham Construction, 3rd: Sunrise Salvage and Uhaul. There were plenty of beautiful antique and vintage vehicles to pick from this year. First went to Sid and Gail Baker with their 1959 red Matheson's 1925 dark blue Star and the Wells family came third for their 1953 Massey Harris Colt tractor.

Gate numbers were down a little from previous years and that was likely a result of the unsettled weather. The entrance gate returns of \$22,840 and wristband count of 4,838 adults and students tallied within 0.4%. There are nearly a thousand additional participants who are not included in the paid wristband count. These include competitors and judges in the Highland Dance and the pipe and drum competitions, participants in the heavyweight Highland games, the Canada Day parade, vendors and the

150 or more volunteers that made the day so special for all involved, residents and visitors alike. Many purchase a wristband anyway, which is greatly appreciated.

Additional volunteers, security gating and procedures made the entrance gates very smoothly. The groups benefiting this year from this fundraiser include: the North Cumberland Memorial Hospital Auxiliary, The Pugwash and District Volunteer Fire Department, the Pugwash and Area Ground Search and Rescue, Harbour-Fest, Pugwash and Area Chamber of Commerce, Pugwash Legion Peach Branch 60, the LA Animal Shelter, the Feral Cat Program, the Wentworth C@P site. Other groups that ran fund raising events or booths during the Gathering this year included: Route 6 Snowmobile Club, the Pugwash Yacht Club and Relay for Life.

Many, many thanks go out to the volunteers who do a tremendous job helping with events and helping our visitors enjoy their time in the beautiful little Village of Pugwash.

#### Camp Pagweak



### The Friends of the Margaret King School Brian Tuttle

This photo takes us back 84 years to the construction in 1929 of the *Margaret King School* in Pugwash Junction. The School provided two large classrooms with Cloakrooms, a large Library, a Chemistry Lab, Manual Training and Household Science rooms, washrooms, a Gymnasium, furnace room and a Principal's Office. Out back was a large playground including a rink and race track. In the backdrop to this photo, you can see the modest, one-room *Pugwash Junction School* that would be replaced with the opening of the Margaret King in July of 1930.

The Friends of the Margaret King School Society continues with efforts to develop a memorial to this magnificent school, built by Mr. Cyrus Eaton in honour of his favorite teacher – Ms. Margaret King. A Memorial Park, located at the corner of the Pugwash Junction and Thompson roads, will consist of a granite monument and 6-7 Interpretive Panels placed throughout the site. Work is nearing completion on the granite monument as well as on some of the Interpretive Panels.



The Society currently has 27 members and welcomes new members! Input from alumni and others who have an interest in this project is very beneficial. Those who have been collecting and piecing together a wide range of information, photos and memorabilia certainly welcome input from alumni and others who wish to contribute or who have questions about this school.

## Cumberland County Transportation Services Society (CCTS) - Peter Lewis

Cumberland County Transportation Services Society (CCTS) has recently changed the way rates are calculated in the County. The rates are now based on the kilometres travelled between the point of pickup and destination. Prior to this all fares were based out of Amherst where the vehicles were stationed. CCTS now has sufficient vehicle capacity to provide a more equitable service throughout the County. Rates are based on a return trip. For example: within 10 km of your pick-up the return rate is \$7.00. You could be in Pugwash, Wallace, Wentworth or any other location in the County – the rate is still \$7.00 for a trip up to 10 km from your pick-up; the rate also includes returning you home. For trips of 10 to 20 km from your pick-up point, the rate is \$15.00; for 20 to 35 km, it is \$20.00. Other rates are available on request. Bookings can be made at 667-8149; office hours are weekdays 8:30 to 4:30.

This has been a desire of the CCTS Board members, who reside in the County, for a long time. As CCTS now has received funding for a fourth vehicle and for a new driver, this enhanced service is now possible. Rides must be pre-booked at least 24 hours in advance; it is a door-to-door service. Rides are booked in order of priority. Priority is given to wheelchairs users and others with mobility challenges and for medical appointments.

During the summer and early fall months, CCTS sponsored open mike JAMS at St. Thomas More Church Hall in Pugwash. Proceeds from these JAMS, donations at the door and canteen sales helped raise funds for CCTS.

#### Pugwash and Area Community Health Board

The Pugwash and Area Community Health Board (CHB) has a special bulletin board at the Primary Care Clinic in Pugwash with posters of several activities presented by CHB. Check it out the next time you are in for an appointment.

The blue Pack Your Pills bags, provided by CHB, have been very popular at the clinic in Pugwash. These bags complement the blue medication cards which are also popular. It is important to keep these up to date. The Pack Your Pills bags have the advantage in that the patient actually has their medications available when they see their health care practitioner.

The CHB was involved in several activities over the summer months. In June, we participated in an Elder Abuse session at the Lions' Den in Amherst. This fall, we organized a Wellness Fair which included the Numbers 2 Know clinic once again. We also had presentations on Personal Directives, the new 211 program in Nova Scotia and Your Way to Wellness.

Our recent monthly meetings included a presentation from Michelle Richard of the Pugwash DHS Youth Health Centre and Ruthie Patriquin from the Sexual health Centre for Cumberland County for Cumberland County. The CHB is looking at the setting up a Facebook page.
