

Construction for Pugwash Water Supply to start in July

At \$15 million, the water supply project in Pugwash is one of the biggest infrastructure projects to be undertaken in the Province this year. The funding for the construction of the project, as announced last summer, is shared between the federal, provincial and municipal governments. The tender for the pipework, and other construction for the water supply system, closes on Tuesday, June 21st and is expected to be awarded within days of closing. Construction is expected to start by mid July. Every effort will be made to reduce any inconvenience to the residents and visiting public. Part of the tender stipulates that construction is to avoid affecting summer festivals such as Canada Day and HarbourFest.

Construction includes laying all the main piping and all branch lines to individual property boundaries. Tenders for the treatment building and reservoir will be issued later this summer for construction in 2017. The map below shows the approximate routing of piping. Residents can expect traffic delays as trench work proceeds, but progress is expected to be fast and piping kept to one side of any road to reduce inconvenience to the traveling public.



Peter Cottingham, Engineering Technician Capital Projects at the Municipality of Cumberland County, informed the Pugwash Village office that more information will be available soon, as details are finalized. A more precise cost estimate will be communicated to property owners in the near future. Another Open House in the village will be arranged in the next few weeks.

Multi Purpose Centre

The multi purpose centre project has now been included with the overall waterfront development concept as suggested by various government departments in order to present a united and unified design concept for the Village.

Some difficulties are still present with respect to the siting of the multi purpose centre and ongoing discussions with the owner of the prime property identified have led to an impasse. Further sites are now being considered and it is hoped that resolution of the siting can result in the project progressing to the final design stage in the near future.

There have been numerous meetings with Cumberland County and ACOA over the past year and it seems that there is now some shared optimism for the coming year.

CIB sponsored a walking Geomatic 12 students will be spending several classes in Palmerston's cemetery this month as they record GPS coordinates for each stone and historical data that includes names, dates and military ranks. The information will be displayed in spreadsheets and added to Arcview maps. For Geomatics class, students will analyze the data and answer questions such

as: What was average age in 1900s? What cultural groups lived in the area and how have they changed?

This project will extend for several years, with the goal of sharing mapped data with national cemetery websites such as the 'Cemetery Project'. Students can easily supply the GPS coordinate of the cemetery now. Soon, they will be able to identify the GPS coordinates and family name for every grave. Next year, students will visit other cemeteries to collect more data.

Redevelopment Project Update

Funding set aside for planning, design and architectural drawings for a redeveloped health care facility in Pugwash is being put to good use, thanks to work that is currently underway in the local area. While there was no specific capital funding earmarked in the provincial budget for construction this year, the important work of determining what programs and services are needed to meet community needs now and into the future is proceeding.

Since February, health officials with Nova Scotia Health Authority have been meeting with the local ad hoc Committee for a New Health Care

Facility to review data and information related to community needs to inform facility planning. The results of these consultations, as well as other data sources, are now being shared with a new Project Planning Committee. The Project Committee has been given the specific responsibility to guide the strategic development of a clinical services plan that will inform the space planning for the facility building on the work previously completed in 2014. In addition to the site manager, physician lead and zone executive director, the Project Committee will include other representatives from Nova Scotia Health Au-

thority with specialized expertise to support this planning. Work of the Project Committee will continue over the summer months and further updates should be available in the fall.

Local residents are well aware of the infrastructure challenges with the current North Cumberland Memorial Hospital and the planning work that has been underway for a number of years. The process being undertaken by the Project Committee will enable NS Health Authority to develop a comprehensive plan to meet the future needs of the community as part of a larger provincial health system.

Cyrus Eaton School Garden Project



The super keen students of Cyrus Eaton Elementary have been hard at work in the dirt planting vegetables and flowers all around the schoolyard. The garden club began in early April with a whopping 42 students signed up the first day. By the second week 64 kids had signed up and we had to split them into 2

groups. They have planted 8 trees, a variety of pollinator friendly perennials, spinach, peas, and each student is raising some transplants at home for planting in June. They are learning about propagating grape vines, climates and soil types, names of plants, and many other great gardening info. The support for this

project has been community wide, a big huge thanks to Communities in Bloom, The Pugwash Co-op, Harrisons, Home Hardware, The Ecology Action Center, The Municipality of Cumberland, and the Pugwash Farmers Market.

FRIENDS OF THE MARGARET KING SCHOOL SOCIETY

The Margaret King School Memorial Park is in Pugwash Junction. Beside the Memory Chair sits a picnic table to be shaded by a newly planted elm tree; given as a memorial gift to a 100 year old gentleman, Allen Roblee 1915 -Oct. 2015. According to our history, Mr Robee teamed a total of 10 horses to haul the big fully grown oak and elm as far as Oxford and back to Steltrees to the school property in 1930. He was present at the unveiling of the monument.

We have lots of important history to be documented with pictures to make ready for the "History Panel".
