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Local committee and residents told at town hall meeting: new Pugwash hospital may be several years away



The North Cumberland Memorial Hospital is 50 years old and is badly in need of a replacement. The current facility has served the community well in the past. However, it is a split-level building with no elevator. There is no central air conditioning system. The washrooms are not wheelchair accessible. There is no ambulance bay which means transfers of patients must occur outside in all types of weather. Patient transfers from

10 nearby East Cumberland Lodge, a long term 10 care facility, must occur by ambulance even 11 though the distance is only a few hundred 11 metres. With these deficiencies, it is very difficult to recruit providers to Pugwash 11 when they can look to other communities 11 with more modern facilities in which to prac-12 tice medicine. With its large senior population, this point is one of the greatest con-12 cerns for Pugwash area residents.

Citizens of the community have been waiting and listening through a series of announcements for a new facility for at least 10 years.

None have come to fruition. The Nova Scotia Health Authority has recently announced that it will not recommend a new facility for the fiscal year 2016-2017.

At the invitation of the ad hoc Committee for a New Health Care Facility for Pugwash; Janet Knox, CEO of the NS Health Authority and other representatives spoke to the community at a town hall presentation on March 1st to explain where this decision came from with the presentation " Planning for Health Services in Pugwash". About 200 people gathered at the High School cafeteria. After the presentations were made by Ms Knox and local health care providers, there was a lively question and answer session.

Ms Knox told the meeting that although there is no money in the Provincial budget for a new facility, there is \$1.5 million set aside for planning, design and architectural drawings for a new facility. Ms Knox told the meeting that this level of planning had not

FARM TO SCHOOL INITATIVE

Jenn Houghtaling has been leading the charge on a new series of initiatives on behalf of the Farmers' Market with the Cyrus Eaton Elementary School to bring local food into their programing. These include:

- A "Local" Christmas Dinner was provided to everyone in the school before the holidays, including turkey, potatoes, and corn and carrots. consultation/default_e.cfm to complete a survey.

Continuing the effort to understand the species and numbers of birds that frequent the area at different times of the year, the Christmas bird count occurred on January 3. Half dozen individuals hiked or drove, with key stops, from the harbour to Conns Mills and back. A total of 240 birds from 23 species were observed that day.

A new committee (loosely called Future Concepts) of FOPE has started to look at ideas having the potential of producing economic activity centered on the Estuary. The immediate idea being promoted is to create a continuous trail that would encircle the Estuary. Though still in very early stages, this committee has started to look at how this could be accomplished by connecting existing trails, as well as building new ones. Holly Refuse, Nurse Practitioner (NP), gave a well-received presentation to the Pugwash and Area Community Health Board (CHB), about recent trends in the role of nurse practitioner in Nova Scotia. CHB board members noted that the delivery of health care in the Pugwash area has been greatly enhanced by NPs and that residents are very appreciative of the care provided by NPs. There have been many changes in health care delivery in the Province since 2002 when there were only two nurse practitioners. Today there are about 130 NPs of three types practicing in the Province: pediatric/ neonatal, acute care NPs and family of all ages NPs.

A nurse practitioner is a registered nurse with an advanced education and an expanded scope of practice. NPs are required to complete an approved education program, meet entry-level competency requirements and pass an exam specific to their focus. Once their education is completed, NPs establish a collaborative practice relationship with a physician or group of physicians who will be available for consultation about client care.



There are seven NPs practicing in Cumberland County including two in Pugwash. These are Family of all Ages NPs in Primary Care. There are about 80 of this type of NP who usually practice in rural Nova Scotia. Pediatric/neonatal NPs practice at the IWK Hospital. Acute Care NPs are typically found in hospital settings and often specialize. These NPS practice in hematology, cardiology, geriatric and hypertension clinics mostly in HRM.

NPs have the knowledge and skill to diagnose and treat acute and chronic illness. They can prescribe medications, order and interpret laboratory and diagnostic tests including blood work, X-ray, CT, ultrasound and MRI. Some other roles central to NP care include: flu clinics, well baby clinics, numbers to know clinics, teen health clinics, long term care assessments, seniors' clinics and collaborative emergency centers.

Local Nurse Practitioner Speaks to the

Pugwash and Area Community Health Board

There have been recent changes in the role of an NP. Legislation changes in 2012 now enable an NP to sign a medical certificate of death. This is especially helpful for NPs in long term care and palliative care. Effective November 2014, NPs are able to prescribe controlled substances. To facilitate this change, NPs were reguired to complete an approved education program and training. As a result, NPs are in a better position to accommodate persons with acute pain, chronic pain, anxiety, ADHD or in palliative care. Effective march 2015, NPs are able to discharge patients from hospitals. This is particularly useful to NPs practicing in collaborative emergency centers, emergency rooms, inpatient units and day surgery.

The Ad hoc Committee for a New Health Care Facility for Pugwash continues to meet Nova Scotia Health Authority staff to re-develop the plans for a new health care facility and will do so over the spring and summer months. The Health Authority is currently developing provincial plans around major services such as palliative care, mental health and addictions as well as others. The Pugwash plan needs to be re-developed to take into account our needs in the community here and to consider the provincial plans. We need a tight, well organized plan that is evidence based that the Health Authority can take to Government. The goal is to have this process completed in time for consideration and, thinking positively, for inclusion in the 2017-18 fiscal year. Some themes under consideration are: primary care, continuing care, mental health and addictions, palliative care, collaborative emergency centre trends, chronic disease and emergency health services. The Ad hoc Committee is committed to developing the best plan possible for a new facility for Pugwash at the earliest possible date.
