
Central Water Supply - latest News

Work is progressing rapidly on the completion of the water supply project. The main distribution line has been completed on the Pugwash Point Road, as well as service laterals to individual properties. The distribution main on Gulf Shore Road will be completed on or about September 7th. Crews will then move on to Gulf Lane, followed by completion of the extension to the fire station. All pipe work, including laterals to each property boundary, should be complete before the end of September.

Construction of the storage reservoir in West Pugwash is underway. The foundation of the structure is complete and construction of the tank will begin after Labour Day. Work also continues on the treatment building and installation of the treatment equipment, well pumps and associated electrical and mechanical work

By mid-September, Municipal staff will be delivering an information pamphlet door to door. This will contain details on the installation of water meters for each residence, information on when you can hook up to the system and contact info for contractors who have expressed interest in working with homeowners to connect to the system.

In 1955 the Russell/Einstein Manifesto asked: "shall we put an end to the human race?" The threat was Nuclear War and just two years later in July of 1957, 22 scientists from both sides of the Iron Curtain gathered at Thinkers Lodge in Pugwash to begin the process of mapping steps to curb nuclear proliferation. This was the first meeting of the Pugwash Conferences on Science and World Affairs (www.pugwash.org) that together with Joseph Rotblat were honored with the Nobel Peace Prize in 1995.

We are gathering international thought leaders together with local community leaders again at the Thinkers Lodge – on the 60th anniversary of that 1957 meeting. We will discuss climate change, the second threat to

mankind, and to frame a message to the Atlantic Canada region and to the world.

Big crowds arrived in Pugwash for Canada Day 2017 - Canada's 150th birthday. Despite and hour or so of hard rain late afternoon, gate numbers of 5,058 were actually up a little from last year. The gate receipts were correspondingly similarly up at \$23,826. We're still waiting for some invoices to come in, but overall the Gathering again did very well financially. The festival is hoping to be in a position to make a significant contribution towards the cost of a new stage in Eaton Park. The current stage started life as a temporary platform for the dance competition in 1951. It has been added to over the years, but 66 years in the Maritime weather, right on the shore of the harbour, the original structure now needs replacement.

We had over 30 vendors, some extending

their stay for the extended three day holiday with the Tall ships and HarbourFest joining in on the fun of Canada 150.

The Highland Dance competition had to be moved to August (see below).

The Opening ceremonies were held at 2pm with speakers from most levels of government, including newly elected MLA Elizabeth Smith-McCrossin.

The pipe band winners were: Grade 5: 36th Highlanders Grade 4 1st: Dartmouth and District Pipe Band. In the afternoon, the four pipe bands marched as one massed band along Water Street for the prize giving. The president of the Federation of Scottish Culture in Nova Scotia, Tom Wallace, made the presentations.

Entertainment in the park was interrupted by rain in the early evening, but the last two bands of the night, Alycia Putnam and family and Gordie MacKeenman and his Rhythm Boys came back on stage to round off the evening.

The rain made preparations for the fireworks too difficult, so they were set off the next evening, to the delight of several thousand people who came back into Pugwash to watch the spectacle.

Many thanks go to the volunteers who gave a few hours of their time to help with the gates, banking, pipes and drums and other events.

Canada Day falls on a Sunday next year. We will continue with long standing tradition and hold all regular Canada Day events on Monday, July 2nd.

The dates of Pugwash HarbourFest coincided with the Gathering of the Clans /Canada Day long weekend celebrations this year. Next year, Pugwash HarbourFest will

resume its typical schedule and will happen July 27-29th in 2018.

Tall Ships visited this year with free access to the vessels. About 5,000 people toured the ships with thousands more observing from the dock or on the water. Other events taking place under the Pugwash HarbourFest banner including the Recycled Regatta, Lobster Trap Maze, Head in The Hole Boards, Quilt and Art Displays and on and on the entertainment continued, both at Eaton Stage and in "The Salt Shaker" on the salt mine wharf.

Eight additional floating docks have helped since create the "HarbourFest Horseshoe" situated at Dinghy Beach. It is the desire of Pugwash HarbourFest to utilize these docks for public access as much of the year as possible. The "HarbourFest Horseshoe" will provide an enclosed area at the beach for younger, inexperienced swimmers as well as additional temporary berthing for small watercraft, expanded canoe and kayak launches and more. We will seek the Village's assistance in some capacity with respect to placement, monitoring and associated costs of this installation.

Many, many thanks to all the volunteers who helped make this another fabulous Pugwash festival. There will be a general meeting in late October to start plans for next year, source more volunteers and elect new officers.

Open Hamper Food Bank Garden Has A Bountiful First Season

On Prince Albert Street, between Water and Russel Streets, is a double lot of vacant land that the Village of Pugwash has owned for some time. Years ago, the carnival set up the midway rides on the property for July 1st. If you have been by there lately, you will see a bounty of vegetables (and some flowers) growing on the lot.



Earlier this year, the Open Hamper Food Bank first asked the village to use the property and then asked its clients if they would like to help with a garden to produce fresh vegetables during the summer/fall months. A supporting committee of members from the Pugwash and Area Community Health Board, the Open Hamper Food Bank and Communities in Bloom was organized to oversee the project. Volunteers from the community worked with Food Bank clients to prepare the garden plot, plant, water, weed and harvest the vegetables. Financial help came from individuals, the Municipality of Cumberland, monetary donation and Communities in Bloom and donations of transplants, seeds and soil all ensured the success of getting the garden "off the ground".

As the growing season begins to slow down, clients are making suggestions as to what veggies we can add to the garden next season. They would also like to try their hand at growing their own transplants.

The plot of land behind O'Brien's Pharmachoice will see tool/garden supply shed (pending repairs) donated by the village, a small greenhouse next spring and next summer - another garden of bounty!



Northumberland Community Curling Club
