August 20th. Over 40 technicians, presenters and support staff from TSN and Kraft were in Pugwash for a live broadcast of TSN Sports Desk. About 3,000 people came to Pugwash and a view ing public of about 10,000,000 people watched as Alex Parker (whose essay won Pugwash the nomination for the online voting part of the competition), his grandfather Roy Mattinson and Sport Pugwash president Bert McWade were presented with a \$25,000 cheque to go towards improvements for the ball field at Sport Pugwash. A new fence is already installed with more improvements to follow.

Pugwash Area Master Plan Lisa Betts, steering committee

The Master Plan Steering Committee has met periodically over the past several months. The Action Teams that report to the Steering Committee include the Multi-purpose team, the infrastructure team and the tourism team.

From Elaine Graham-Cook, co-chair: The Multipurpose Committee is working hard and progress is being made. A Request for Proposals was issued to engage consultants who will come up with a Conceptual Design and Business/Management Model for the development of the Multi-Purpose Community Centre for Pugwash and area. The RFP closed on September 14th. The committee will review and select a proposal. The result will be an inclusive plan to have a multipurpose centre and refurbished train station to best serve the village of Pugwash.

The infrastructure action team identified supplied water as prime importance to investigate. Well water was tested in the Village and the next phase is to identify possible supply well fields in the areas.

Ron Patterson adds: "Subsequent to water quality testing done in January, concern was expressed about the fact that a few homes sampled had arsenic and uranium levels above the Canadian Drinking Water Quality Guidelines.

The Municipality of Cumberland County agreed to offer free testing to all Pugwash rate payers for arsenic and uranium to ensure those with levels over the guideline limits become aware of the possible health impacts of using such water in the home. A newsletter was sent out to all rate payers and 137 responded and had their water sampled on August 21&22. Results were mailed out last week .

The Tourism team is working towards improved signage and at a site for gas and diesel supply for recreational boaters. Safer and more available fuelling for boats has been identified as a need to better protect the environment and to attract more boaters to the area, helping our local economy.

Pugwash and Area Community Health Board

The Pugwash and Area Community Health Board (CHB) has a busy series of events planned for the fall months. We are developing a Community Health Plan for 2012-2015. A survey was carried out during the summer with more than 600 replies. A number of priority issues were identified: healthy eating and physical activities, mental health, injury prevention and among youth 81 % responded that sexual health was a priority. Other issues are alcohol abuse, tobacco use, problem gambling and chronic disease prevention. The target date for completion of the Plan is mid October with a presentation to the Cumberland Health Authority at its November meeting.

The Cumberland County Helping Tree summarizes the various health related services available in the County. To increase awareness of the surprisingly large number of services, the Pugwash CHB will be placing this as an insert in local media and plan to do the same through the schools at the first fall reporting period. Please look for it.

The Pugwash CHB is sponsoring a session on Personal Directives on September 27 at Pugwash Area Ground Search and Rescue building on King St. The time will be 3:30pm to 5:30pm. A Personal Directive sets out a plan which ensures that a person's personal care decisions will be followed in the event that the person is incapacitated for whatever reason. Some of these may include: health care, home care, power of attorney and who the person wishes to make these decisions on their behalf.

During HarbourFest, the CHB held a successful sunscreen promotion. We thank the Canadian Salt Company for donating the sunscreen materials.

The Friends of the Pugwash Estuary (FOPE) have just completed a very active and productive season. In the spring, members participated in an event designed to protect against a very invasive species, the glossy buckthorn. The walking trail on Victoria Island was refurbished and a successful Flotilla was held on August 15.

This summer two students (Brandon Rushton and Mikayla Sears) were hired through the Nova Scotia Youth Conservation Corp. They worked with Chris Wild on the ongoing upstream restoration project as part of the Adopt-A-Stream Program. As well as putting in digger logs and assessing culverts, they worked with a local farmer to install an electric fence to limit cattle access to a stream. A third student, Jeffrey Blaikie, worked on a research project exploring the oyster fishing potential in the area.

An exciting new project for the group is the projected purchase of an 8 acre property at the mouth of Doherty Creek. Short term plans, upon closing, include building maintenance and boat launch enhancements to support a public launch for small watercraft, canoes and kayaks. Long term plans include an estuary interpretive trail, interpretive center and clubhouse for FOPE. Fundraising will continue throughout the year to help support this huge undertaking.

This year we have reached a new milestone as we are now 120 members strong. We meet the first Tuesday of the month at the Pugwash Village Hall at 7pm. New members are always welcome. Join or make a donation by contacting our Chairperson, Alice Power at 243-3580

My fellow commissioners elected me as their chair in June and I chaired our public meeting for the first time. I am pleased that Rod agreed to stand as the Vice Chair and want to thank Jim Whitman who held that post for several years for his outstanding service in that capacity. Our team at the Commission level is strong with Linda Langille and the recent addition of Dr. Chris Mullaley. I remind you that we are unpaid volunteers whereas many of the Village Commissioners in Nova Scotia, receive an honorarium.

At my first meeting back in June I made a point of extending an olive branch to all who opposed the VC in order to help us put the past behind us and to work with us to make the VC better. We welcome input and constructive criticism as all of us want to make Pugwash a better place in which to live. The response so far has been amazing and very encouraging, so I believe that much of what did divide us will be the past and left there. I thank some of the key people who wanted change, have accepted the results with grace and dignity and offered to assist the VC as we go forward.
